Course Syllabus David Young

<u>Course Description</u>: This course will examine the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ as recorded in the four Gospels. Attention will be paid to the literary, theological, and historical backgrounds of each Gospel as well as of Jesus himself, and the significance of each of these discussed.

- Gain confidence in the reliability of the Gospels.
- Learn how to read the Gospels individually and synoptically.
- Discover who Jesus was in his historical and theological context.
- Develop a healthy Christology.
- Learn why Jesus matters to the world.
